NEW TO THE AREA?

Congratulations on your fine choice and WELCOME to our great little community! Currently the population at Muriwai Beach sits at just over 1,000. We are a diverse yet passionate, pro-active bunch, who care deeply for our backyard and love to look out for our neighbours.

Popular things to do here include surfing, kite surfing, blokarting, paraponting and hang gliding, especially when the prevailing westerly wind provides favourable conditions. Fishing is also popular (yet can be dangerous at times), as is mountain biking and hiking (there are some excellent wilderness tracks close by).

Our unbroken 50km stretch of beach extending all the way up the Tasman Sea coast to the mouth of the Kaipara Harbour is fantastic for dog walkers, horse riders and 4WD enthusiasts. And if you're a keen golfer you're in luck, as our links course is considered one of the world's best.

"That's all good, but when's rubbish day?" you may be asking. This booklet contains more info about living here, along with a practical guide on local services and amenities.

A BIT OF BACKGROUND

HISTORY The name Muriwai was not widely used until the 1920's. It means 'water's end' or 'backwater' and was used when referring to the lower portion of the Muriwai Stream (behind the Lodge Store). Prior to this, the 50km stretch of beach between Papakanui Spit at the entrance of the Kaipara Harbour and Toaraerae (Flat Rock) was known as Te One Rangatira (The Chiefly Beach) – while the surrounding area was known as Motutara, which means 'Island of Sea Birds'.

The first people to occupy the area were the Turehu – 'those who arose from the earth'. Small groups of Maori occupied pa sites on the point and on the hill north of the stream. It is believed that Europeans first visited the area in 1820, when Samuel Marsden (an early missionary to New Zealand) recorded the black sand hills. The first European settlers followed around 50 years later, and the first store was opened in 1888.

The area became a popular holiday retreat in the summer months, with up to 120 people camping on the land behind the beach, which the park now occupies. The beach was used extensively for motor racing from the 1920s through to the 1940s.

۸ GANNET COLONY

About 1,200 pairs of adult gannets nest here, August to March every year. **GEOGRAPHY** Muriwai Regional Park was established in 1969 and extends from Maukatia (Maori Bay) in the south up Muriwai Beach for 8km. Much of the land at the southern end of the beach is part of the Muriwai Regional Park. Maukatia to the south is separated from Muriwai Beach by Otakamiro Point, with its steep cliffs and rocky nesting areas that are home to the region's only colony of Australasian gannets. The Regional Park includes a golf course along Coast Rd, and the area north of Okiritoto Stream is known as the "Five Mile Strip" or "Five Mile Block" as this is its approximate length. A horse park (parking area for horse floats and trucks to unload) is located just to the south of Okiritoto Stream. Limited 4WD access on to the beach is also provided at this point (a permit is required).

GEOLOGY Sand and rock (sedimentary), older volcanic material, with many concretions and layers in the cliff walls. A blowhole plays often. The shore platform is also well jointed, with the main rock type being piha conglomerate. Muriwai Beach has black sand, caused by the iron content derived from the ancient volcanoes in the area, including the large "Kaipara Volcano" which was situated offshore from the Kaipara Heads, and erupted 23-16 million years ago. The black sand is moved up the west coast of the North Island by longshore drift.

WILDLIFE Muriwai Beach is home to a wide range of wildlife, including a fur seal colony on Oaia Island, nesting grounds north of the surf tower for the endangered dotterel, little blue penguins at Maukatia (Maori Bay), and of course, the famous colony of Takapu (Australasian gannets) on Otakamiro Point (currently about 1,200 pairs nest here from August to March each year). Ocean species are also abundant; whale and dolphin sightings are fairly common.

GOOD TO KNOW

RUBBISH DISPOSAL: This is a paid service. Collection is every Tuesday morning, either from a red bin or pre-paid green bags (these are available from our local supermarkets). Recycling service is free. Collection is every other Tuesday morning from green and yellow bins.

SEPTIC TANKS: Muriwai does not have a sewerage system and all houses use some kind of septic treatment. There are three types. Standard septic tanks are usually made from concrete and have a single tank. These tanks separate solids and liquids and usually require little maintenance. These tanks do however need to be serviced every 3 - 5 years as they can pollute the surrounding environment. They also don't allow for treatment or waste disposal. Treatment plants and aerobic septic tanks are either provided with one tank, or tank that is separated into

separate chambers/tanks. These provide either aeration, sand or cloth filtration. These tanks are environmentally friendly, treats effluents and separates solids. However, these tanks should be serviced twice annually and emptied every 3 - 5 years. Not all treatment plants have equal usability. Worm farm treatment plants either have a one tank chamber or are divided into separate tanks. They are extremely versatile and work by breaking down

solids naturally, including food waste - providing an environmentally friendly tank which only has to be emptied every 10 - 15 years. These tanks should be serviced twice a year and can only be cleaned with bio safe products.

WATER SUPPLY /TANKS:

Most of Motutara Rd is on mains water and most of Oaia Rd, Waitea Rd, Constable Rd and Domain Crescent is on tank supply. If your water comes from a collection tank, it's up to you to keep your water safe and reduce the risk of water-borne illness from contaminated water. OUT & ABOUT

MURIWAI LOOKOUT:

¹/₂ hour - 0.7km. Entry points at bottom of Waitea Rd and Domain Crescent. Pleasant stroll through mature native bush along to the lookout, with sweeping views put to Oaia Island and up the coast.

TAKAPU REFUGE TRACK:

1/2 hour - 0.8 km. Enter from the carpark at Maukatia/ Maori Bay, skirt around the headland then descend to the end of Muriwai Beach Access Road. At the top, two tracks branch out to lookouts over the gannet colony.

EDWIN MITCHELSON

TRACK: ½ hour - 1.1km Enter from the reserve on Oaia Road, descend through forest to the lookout Track (20 mins) then branch off to Edwin Mitchelson Road. Enjoy spectacular views north up Muriwai Beach.

MAUKATIA / MAORI BAY

TRACK: 10 mins - 0.2 km. Connecting the two carparks, this lovely little track passes by a number of big Puriri trees.

MURIWAI BEACH LOOP:

1.5 hrs one way, 4.8km From car park behind surf tower head northwards along marked track through the back of dunes eventually coming out onto beach. Continue north to the beach 4WD vehicle access way before heading inland. From the horse park parking area take Coast Road Track leading back to car park.

GOLDIE BUSH WALKWAY:

4 - 5 hours - 4.5 km one way. Entry is at Constable Rd. Descends gently through native forest with regenerating Kauri, includes the swing bridge (pictured left) and a track along the Mokoroa Stream to the impressive Mokoroa Falls.

TE HENGA WALKWAY:

3 ½ hours one way - 10.3 km. Enter at Constable Road or alternatively at the Bethells end. Dramatic cliffs, waves smashing into rocks and elevated ocean views - it's a spectacular walk, and part of the Hillary Trail.

FOREST USE: The Five Mile Block (extending beyond Coast Road and the horse park) offers recreational trails for walkers and riders. Cyclists enjoy the Coast Rd as far as the top of the Regional Park (but are not permitted into the adjoining Woodhill Forest). Dog walkers also frequent the area, as it provides a range of off-leash walking opportunities.

4WD & BEACH USE: You need a permit if you want to take a vehicle up the beach. These are free, and can be obtained easily online, at the Auckland Council website.

HORSE RIDING: There is dedicated parking for horse trucks/floats at the end of Coast Road. Riding areas includes the beach (north) and Okiritoto Stream.

MOUNTAIN BIKING:

Best place to go nearby is the Woodhill Mountain Bike Park; a purpose-built rider accessed single track network. Loaded with fun for people of all ages.

SURFING: There are multiple spots around Muriwai where you'll find great surf. Maori Bay features a peaky beach break, with swells refracting off the cliffs. South Muriwai is a classic beach break that sometimes has a good lefthander, depending on the sand banks. If you're able to 4WD up the beach, it's likely you'll find a sweet spot all to yourself. Heaven.

ROCK FISHING: Flat rock is the perfect spot - but be aware that fishing from there can be dangerous as the waves are unpredictable. Wear a lifejacket, and check sea conditions first.
